ADMISSION OF OUT-OF-STATE STUDENTS, REQUIREMENT RE: Vice President Patrick reported that the Board of Regents had approved the recommendation of the Regents' Committee on Admissions, regarding the admission of out-of-state freshmen, as follows:

Non-resident Admission. Applicants for admission from accredited secondary schools will be considered for admission if the transcript shows that the applicant has been graduated and has completed an acceptable program of secondary school subjects and has ranked at least in the upper two-thirds, preferably the upper one-half, of his graduating class. College Entrance Examination Board scores (Scholastic Aptitude Test) of at least 350 on the Verbal section and 400 on the Mathematical section are an acceptable substitute for rank in the graduating class.

FACULTY MEMBERS WORKING TOWARD ADVANCED DEGREES AT UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA, POLICY RE: The Senate approved a motion requesting President Harvill to appoint a special committee to study University policy which prohibits faculty personnel with the rank of Assistant Professor or higher working toward an advanced degree from this institution.

CATALOGUE MATERIAL, DISCUSSION RE: The Senate reviewed the proposed catalogue changes, as already approved by the faculties concerned, the Graduate Study Committee, the Coordinating Committee, and the Advisory Council, submitted by the College of Agriculture and the School of Home Economics, the Departments of Military Science and Tactics and Air Science, the College of Law, and the College of Business and Public Administration. The Senate accepted the proposed changes without challenge except for a proposal submitted by the College of Business and Public Administration that the former Science requirement of that college, requiring 8 units of credit in laboratory science, be listed in the new catalogue as a requirement of 8 units in Scientific Method and that as an alternative to 8 units of laboratory science a student be allowed, with special permission, to present either 4 units of laboratory science plus Philosophy 12a (Logic), or 9 units of Philosophy including 12a and 12b (Logic), or an approved sequence of mathematics courses through Mathematics 79a (Analytic Geometry and Calculus). The Senate was informed that no objection had been raised to the substitution of mathematics for the science requirement but that the Coordinating Committee had not approved the proposed alternatives involving philosophy course work. The Advisory Council had approved these proposals despite the Coordinating Committee's objection by a vote of 9 to 8. After lengthy discussion, the Senate approved by a vote of 18 to 12 the proposal of the College of Business and Public Administration that the philosophy course work listed above be accepted in lieu of the "Scientific Method" requirement.
