

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS AND DISQUALIFICATION STANDARDS, COMMITTEE TO STUDY DIFFERENCES BETWEEN: President McCormick referred to action taken by the Advisory Council in setting up a Council committee to consider the lack of correlation between the scholarship requirements for graduation and the standards for disqualification. Because the disqualification standards are so much more liberal than graduation requirements, many students continue in school semester after semester, yet are unable to meet the graduation average of 3.2 (or, in certain cases, the old standard of 80% of the work with grades above "4"). The action taken by the Council had suggested that the report which the Advisory Council received would be referred to the Senate for final action, probably sometime in the fall.

AMENDMENT TO FACULTY CONSTITUTION, AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF FACULTY ON: The President announced that the Secretary had reported that the General Faculty had voted in favor of the proposed amendment by a vote of 192 to 6. The amendment, which would become effective if the Board of Regents approved it at its next meeting, reads as follows:

V, C: No member of the Committee of Eleven shall be eligible to serve more than three terms consecutively.

This was the final Senate meeting of the academic year.
