


TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE FACULTY:

Proceedings of the Faculty Senate
Monday, May 1, 1950

ARIZONA COLLEGE ASSOCIATION, REPORT ON: It was reported that some 70 to 80 members of the University faculty attended the first meeting of the Arizona College Association held at Phoenix on April 29. A total of some 250 representatives of the several institutions in the state were present. It was generally felt that the opportunity for interfaculty relationships would benefit all and that the Association through its meetings would establish a field of usefulness.

SENIOR EXAMINATIONS, DISCUSSION RE: The Senate voted that a faculty committee of seven, including not more than three members of the Senate, be appointed to consider the calendar for final examinations for seniors and to bring in a proposal regarding the integration of the examination schedule and the commencement program., **prior to publication of next catalog.**

"DITCH DAYS," CONSIDERATION OF: The Senate discussed the matter of "ditch days" as observed by several of the colleges. It was discovered that not all of the members of the Faculty have the same understanding regarding University policy affecting "ditch days" and the absences incurred. The official policy as established on February 2, 1948, by the Faculty Senate leaves the responsibility for "ditch days" in the hands of the several colleges and withdraws official excuses for any class absences incurred.

REPORT OF CATALOG CHANGES APPROVED BY ADVISORY COUNCIL:

Department of Zoology. The following new course which is offered beginning with the year 1950-51 takes the place of Entomology 124 (Ornithology).

Zoology 134 Ornithology (4) II. G. Marshall
The natural history of birds and its bearing upon the problems of animal behavior, distribution, and evolution. 2R, 2L, 4-hour field trip.
P, 4b. Fee, \$5.

College of Mines. Approved effective 1950-51.

Metallurgy 115 Heat Treatment of Steels (1) I
A study of the ferrous alloys encountered in the mining industry and their heat treatment. Credit in Metallurgy 115 not permitted if student has credit in 116 or 131. 3L P, Chemistry 1b or 2b. Fee \$2

College of Fine Arts. The Council voted to allow the substitution of Marching Band for required Physical Education in the first semester of the freshman year. The new policy is effective for one year only, however, and its continuation is subject to a check of results obtained during the fall of 1950.

College of Agriculture. The Council approved the following new courses:

Agronomy 101 Forage and Pasture Crops (3) II. G. Sherwood
A study of the principal forage and pasture crops of the United States, emphasizing alfalfa adaptations in the Southwest. 3R. One 1-day field trip. Fee, \$3.

Agronomy 105 Weed Control (3) I. G. Cords
A study of various methods of controlling weeds in agronomic crops. Also information on herbicides, spray equipment and its calibration. 3R. Fee, \$4.

Agronomy 107 Crop Ecology and Geography (3) II. G. Sherwood
A study of environmental factors affecting agronomic crop distribution and geography throughout the world. 3R.

The Council approved the following changes:

Agronomy 103 Oil and Fiber Crops. (3) I. G. Thomas
Problems involved in growing and harvesting such crops as cotton, soybeans, peanuts, and hemp. 3 lecture-demonstration and discussion. P, Agronomy 1. (Given every year) -- This course replaces 103, Cotton Production.

Agronomy 102 Grain and Cereal Crops. (3) I. G. Cords
Problems involved in growing and harvesting such crops as corn, sorghums, barley, wheat and oats. 3 lecture-demonstration and discussion. Fee, \$2. -- This course replaces 102, Cereal Crops. -- (Given odd years only)

Agronomy 104 Alfalfa Production (3) II. G.
Drop this course. Information herein is combined in new course 101.

Agronomy 106 Grading and Judging Seeds, Hays and Cotton (2) II. Staff
Practice in grading and judging seeds, hays, and cotton. 1R, 3L. Fee, \$3. (Given even years only) - This course replaces 106, Grading and Judg. Field Crops

College of Education: The Council approved the following new courses:

Education 241 Directed Application in Guidance (3) II. Roemmich
Actual practice under supervision in applying the principles, techniques,
and tools studied in the guidance program. P, 140, 141, 143.

Education 143 Testing Instruments for School Counselors (3) I G Roemmich
Study, analysis, and evaluation of standardized tests used in counseling;
quantative aspects of the guidance program; use of results of specific
tests. P, Ed. 157, Psych. 150 recommended.


The Council approved the following changes:

Education 141 Educational and Vocational Counseling. (2) II. G.

Change to:

Education 141 Counseling Techniques. (3) I. G.
This is a change in title and in the number of units. The content remains
the same. The new title seems better to fit the content. To be maximally
effective, the course should carry three units.

Education 240 Individual Analysis (2) I.
To be deleted.
Replaced by 143.
