

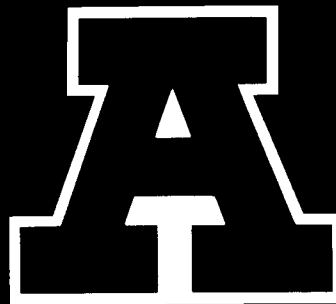

USE OF THIS BULLETIN: Proposals presented in this bulletin are subject to University-wide review. If you are concerned with anything herein enclosed, please contact the University Curriculum Office, Admin. 412, Extension 1-3913, during the two-week waiting period. Concerns raised after two weeks will be referred to the Faculty Senate or appropriate Council. Forms for the submission of curricular materials are available from the above office. All formal submissions should be routed through the appropriate dean or director. Final day for voicing concerns on the following curricular matters is October 2, 1989.

The following Notice (for approval) originally appeared in Curriculum Bulletin, Vol. 13, No. 2, but was withdrawn from consideration at the September 11, 1989 Faculty Senate. It is now presented for consideration at the October 2, 1989 Faculty Senate.

The Department of Media Arts proposes to establish an upper-division standing requirement. Overcrowding in upper-division courses and the desire to maintain a high level of performance by students necessitate an upper-division standing requirement. The resource-intensive nature of the media arts major places severe limits on the number of students that can be served. The department can accommodate a maximum of 150 students in the B.A. program and 200 in the B.F.A. program, for a total of 350. Currently, there are 360 majors in the B.A. program and 224 in the B.F.A. program. The proposal restricts enrollment in its upper-division courses to those who have achieved the following: (1) completed 56 semester units; (2) achieved a minimum of 2.25 on all University credit (minimum of 12 units); (3) achieved a minimum grade-point average of 2.5 on media arts courses; (4) completed all lower-division core courses required in the major (B.A.: 100, 101, 105, 200, and 210 or 214; B.F.A.: 100, 101, 105, 200, 210, 213, 214, 250); (5) passed appropriate portfolio (written or produced); and (6) developed a course of study approved by an advisor. The proposal has the approval of the dean of the Faculty of Fine Arts, and was approved by Undergraduate Council on April 18, 1989.

***** CURRICULUM OFFICE DEADLINES *****

Planning Authorization: October 1, 1989 is the deadline for all requests for new planning authorization and extensions of existing planning authorization due to expire January 1990. Planning authorization must be granted by the Board of Regents prior to the development of the formal new study program request. "Planning Authorization Request for New Study Program" forms are available at the University Curriculum Office, Admin. 412c, or by calling 1-3913.

General Catalog, 1991-93:

(1) January 31, 1990 is the deadline for new program proposals and revisions intended for the 1991-93 catalogs which require Board of Regents approval. New program proposals should be submitted on the "Request for New Study Program" form, available at the University Curriculum Office, Admin. 412c, or by calling 1-3913. Revisions requiring Board of Regents approval, such as change in the name of a major or academic unit or deletion of a major, should be submitted as a memorandum which includes justification for the request and approval of the department head and the cognizant dean. If you are unsure whether or not a proposed revision will require Board of Regents approval, call 1-3913 before the January 31st deadline.

(2) July 2, 1990 is the deadline for requests for new permanent courses to appear in the catalog. These are completed on yellow "Request for New Course of Instruction" forms available at the University Curriculum Office, Admin. 412c, or by calling 1-3913.

(3) October 1, 1990 is the deadline for requests for changes to existing courses. These are completed on blue "Catalog Recommendation" forms available at the University Curriculum Office, Admin. 412c, or by calling 1-3913.



MEMORANDUM

TO: Members of the Faculty Senate

FROM: Jack R. Cole, Acting Provost 

This is in reply to the inquiry regarding the change to the University Handbook for Appointed Personnel language in the memorandum from G.A. Evanoff dated April 4, 1989. When Mr. Evanoff was reviewing Chapter 4, Section 4.11.02, Decisions on Nonrenewal and Continuing Status, 4.11.02 appeared to be in conflict with 4.15, Notice of Nonrenewal. Section 4.11.02 stated "the Provost shall decide whether an individual will be granted continuing status or offered a terminal year appointment." Section 4.15 stated "All continuing-eligible and year-to-year professional personnel whose positions are funded by state appropriations are entitled to no less than 90 days' notice of nonrenewal." The new language "The Provost shall decide whether an individual will be granted continuing status or given terminal notice" should avoid a possible conflict between the two sections. Before Mr. Evanoff changed the language, the proposed change was discussed with the Attorney's Office, the President's Office and the Provost's Office. Unfortunately, the change was not discussed with the Academic Personnel Committee until after the notice was sent to all the appointed personnel. After Doug Jones had discussions with me, and separately with George Evanoff, the change was accepted by Mr. Jones.

By copy of this letter, I am forwarding the suggestion to Mr. Evanoff to have the new language changed to "given notice of nonrenewal" from "given terminal notice." He will make the change the next time a correction is sent to appointed personnel or the manual is reprinted.

I hope this clarifies the incident, and if you need any further clarification, please contact me or George Evanoff.

ACADEMIC PERSONNEL POLICY COMMITTEE
Faculty Senate Meeting
October 2, 1989

The Academic Personnel Policy Committee brings the following recommended change to the Bylaws, page 7, Section 6, lines 2-4, to the Faculty Senate as a seconded motion:

"Section 6: The Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure shall be composed of ~~nine~~ **twelve** tenured or continuing members of the General Faculty other than deans, ~~three~~ **four** of whom shall be elected each year by the General Faculty for a term of three years."

Approval of this motion will serve to guide the Committee on Committees and the Committee on Elections in drafting CAFT nominees and in supervising the General Faculty Elections during Spring 1990. It will also be submitted to the General Faculty for approval when other Constitution/Bylaws changes yet to be approved by the Senate are ready to be submitted to a General Faculty ballot, probably during Spring 1990.

The Academic Personnel Policy Committee submits as a seconded motion the following procedural recommendation to the Committee on Committees:

The Faculty Senate requests that, during 1989-90, the Committee on Committees develop a sufficient number of nominations for the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure to ensure election of six members of that committee, instead of the normal three, during General Faculty Elections, Spring 1990. Reference is made to the Bylaws, Section 6, a: "The Committee on Committees shall provide a list of names containing not less than three times the number to be elected, giving due consideration to representation from the various colleges." A list of eighteen (18) names, therefore, must be drafted.

Approval of this motion will ensure the Committee on Committees will receive proper instructions to guide them until the revised Constitution/Bylaws is in place.

The Academic Personnel Policy Committee submits as a seconded motion the following procedural recommendation to the Committee on Elections:

The Faculty Senate requests that, during 1989-90, election procedures be revised for the Committee on Academic Freedom and Tenure so that six will be elected from the twelve to be placed on the ballot in the Spring of 1990, rather than the normal three which are elected from six nominees. And further, that the four individuals receiving the highest number of ballots cast be elected for three-year terms; the individual receiving the fifth highest number of ballots be elected for a two-year term; and the individual receiving the sixth highest number of ballots be elected for a one-year term.

Approval of this motion will ensure the Committee on Elections will receive proper instructions to guide them until the revised Constitution/Bylaws is in place.
