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A. County Situation

There are 10 recognized communities in Greenlee County. Boys 4-H club work was carried on in four of these communities. These clubs were all organized in the fall and closed their club year on October 1, 1953. Girls clubs were in three communities. One has been added this fall.

Boys groups, other than 4-H in the county includes Boys Scouts and one FFA group.

Recreational facilities are limited mainly to those of school and churches. All schools have good gyms and team equipment. The town of Duncan carried on a summer recreational program.

From one viewpoint there should be a wealth of potential leadership in the county. In some communities, however, it is difficult to find leaders who have time to devote to youth.

Farming, cattle raising, and mining are the three important industries. Geographically, the county is divided into areas of three interests. Average farm income of county families is estimated at \$3500.

Community life and recreation center in the churches and schools. There are three town libraries sponsored by the Women's Clubs in Duncan, Clifton, and Morenci. There is one hospital in the county, a Phelps Dodge Corporation institution in the mining town of Morenci.

There is one county newspaper and one radio station in the county.

Girls' work consists of foods, clothing, and junior leadership. Boys' work consists of agricultural projects and junior leadership. Leader training was given along both subject matter and on organizational lines. One general training session was held at which leaders and club officers were trained by state and county staff. Essentially, clubs and their leaders plan and execute their own programs with guidance from the County Extension Agents.

Activities along with project work include parties of any kind, community service, and participation in the county fair. The York Club purchased records from the county recreation fund and held regular folk dancing sessions after each meeting. The "Welcome To Greenlee County" signs were erected on Highway 70 by the Franklin Farmers, and a picture and write-up were published in the National 4-H News.

4-H Club work in any community has meant that boys and girls have a chance to learn home-making and agricultural techniques with others of their own age, cooperation on the part of parents, the challenge to work cooperatively outside of school, development of leadership, and a chance to put each community into the news of county activities.

C. Organization and Planning

Clubs were reorganized this year by leaders contacting all boys and girls in their respective communities. The agents assisted with the first reorganization meeting of each club and helped plan the program for the year. Junior leaders assist in subject matter teaching as well as in organizational procedures.

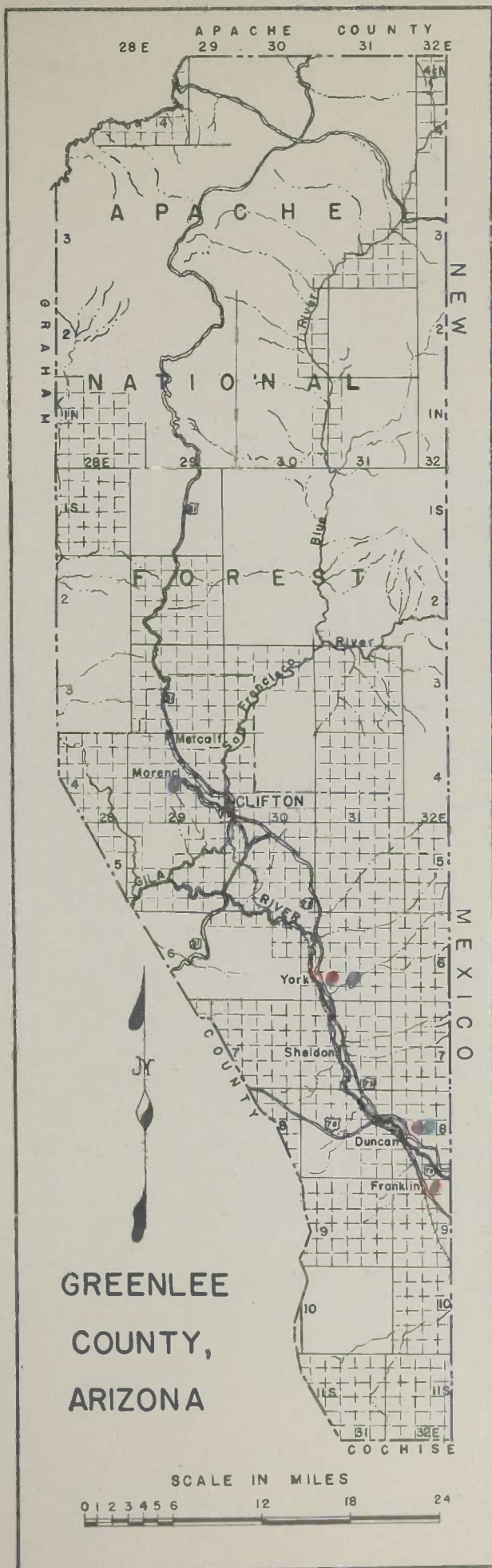
Following this report section is a county map showing the location of agricultural clubs, home economics clubs, and mixed membership clubs.

Since the county was without an home demonstration agent until February 16 of 1953, there was a great deal of catching up to do in the home economics clubs. Clubs had been organized in October and had not accomplished much project work. For the first time this year, contests for selecting state Round-up delegates were not held in the Fall at the county fair. Leaders were given help on project work and how to prepare for judging and demonstrations. Elimination contests were held in Duncan with 24 girls competing in judging, demonstrations, and dress revue. Girls and leaders were working under handicap because of the reverse method of working this year. These Round-up representatives came out very well in their contests considering the situation.

The Duncan Theater cooperated in financing the Round-up trips of Greenlee County 4-H Club members by setting aside two days of National 4-H Week for the sale of tickets by club members. These clubs received one half of the income from the sale of tickets. Schools and churches are always helpful in providing meeting places for special events.

At the present time there is no 4-H council or leader's organization in the county. It is planned to bring 4-H leaders together for training meetings and informal discussions during the coming club year 1953 - 54. It is felt that this preliminary work is necessary before a formal leader organization can be organized.

All 4-H clubs have been reorganized for the club year 1953 - 1954. A slight gain in enrollment is noted in some agricultural clubs. A new home economics club has been organized at Clifton. The local Duncan Agriculture Club has a change in leadership. Mr. Jack Lunt, a former 4-H boy and long time 4-H booster, has replaced Mr. Estel Miller. Because Mrs. Sue Davis is employed Mrs. Stanley Coon will serve as leader in the Duncan Home Economics Club. Mrs. Coon is the mother of Nancy Coon, an active former member now away at college. All other clubs have the same leaders with the exception of several new junior leaders.

E. Leadership in 4-H Club Work

Home economics leaders were given project training by club groups as the year was well along when the Home Demonstration Agent came to the county in February. Leaders were also included in adult leader training meetings in their project. Judging and demonstration training was given to each home economics club by the Home Demonstration Agent.

One special leader training meeting was held at Morenci for the leader of the newly formed insect club there. Dr. Roney and the agent conducted an insect collection school for the leader of that club. Three leader training meetings in livestock judging was held at various ranches in the county. These meetings were conducted by the agent and assisted by Jack Lunt, President of the Greenlee County Cattle-Growers' Association. Individual assistance has been given to leaders along all lines of club work by the agents. Club members with their leaders plan their own programs under the supervision of the agents.

In some instances junior leaders do more than is required by the project. They sometimes do more technical work than adult leaders. Junior leaders are boys and girls who have come up in the 4-H way and have the know-how of teaching 4-H aims and practices. They work closely with adult leaders and Extension Agents.

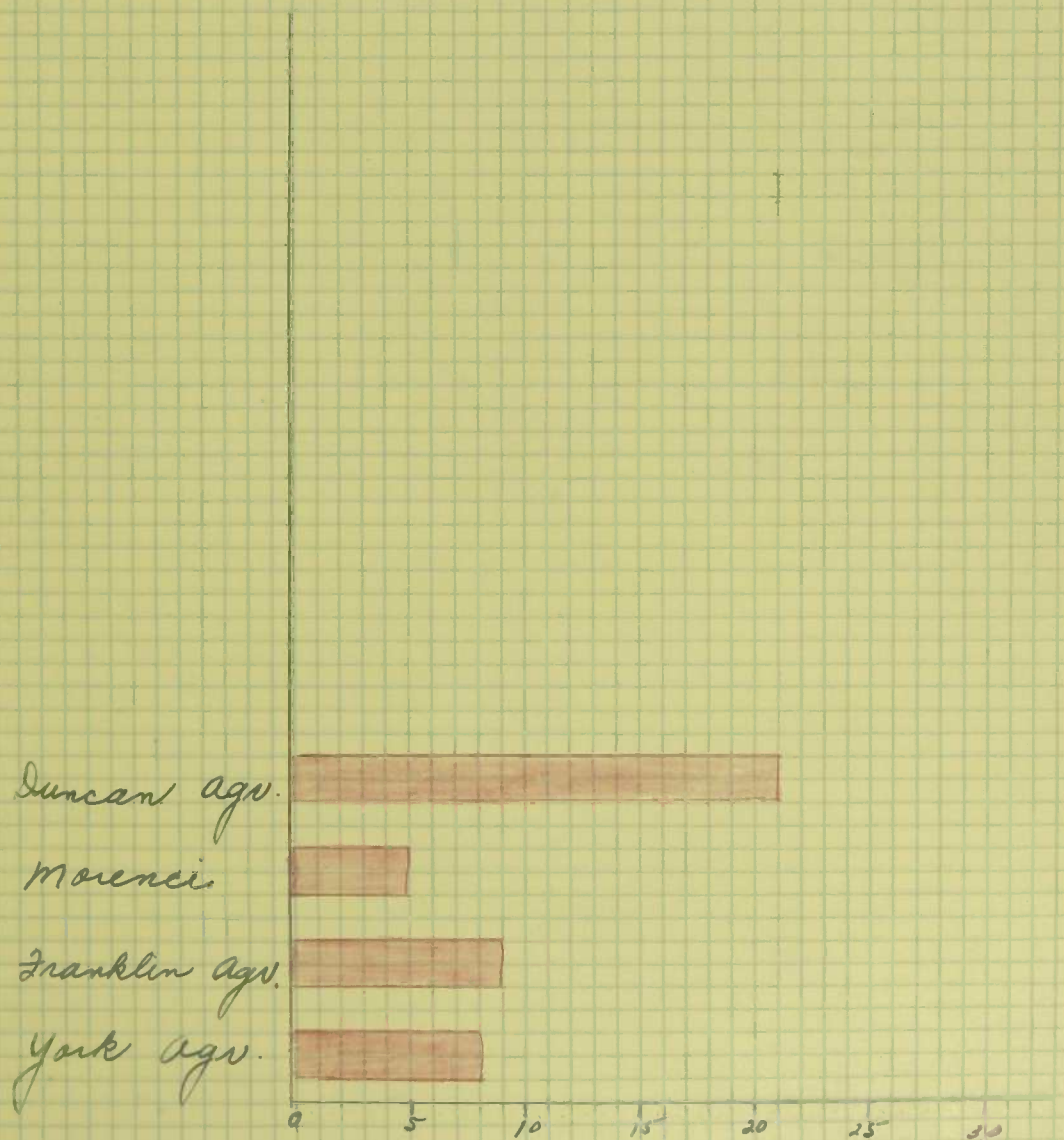
Two junior leaders and the Home Demonstration Agent attended the State Leadership Conference in Flagstaff. This is a training school sponsored by the Sears Roebuck Foundation. It is most worthwhile for leaders to learn organization and project methods from state and county staff members and guest speakers. The recreation training is excellent and inspirational. Leaders gain much through exchange of ideas with other leaders. We hope to have more attend next year.

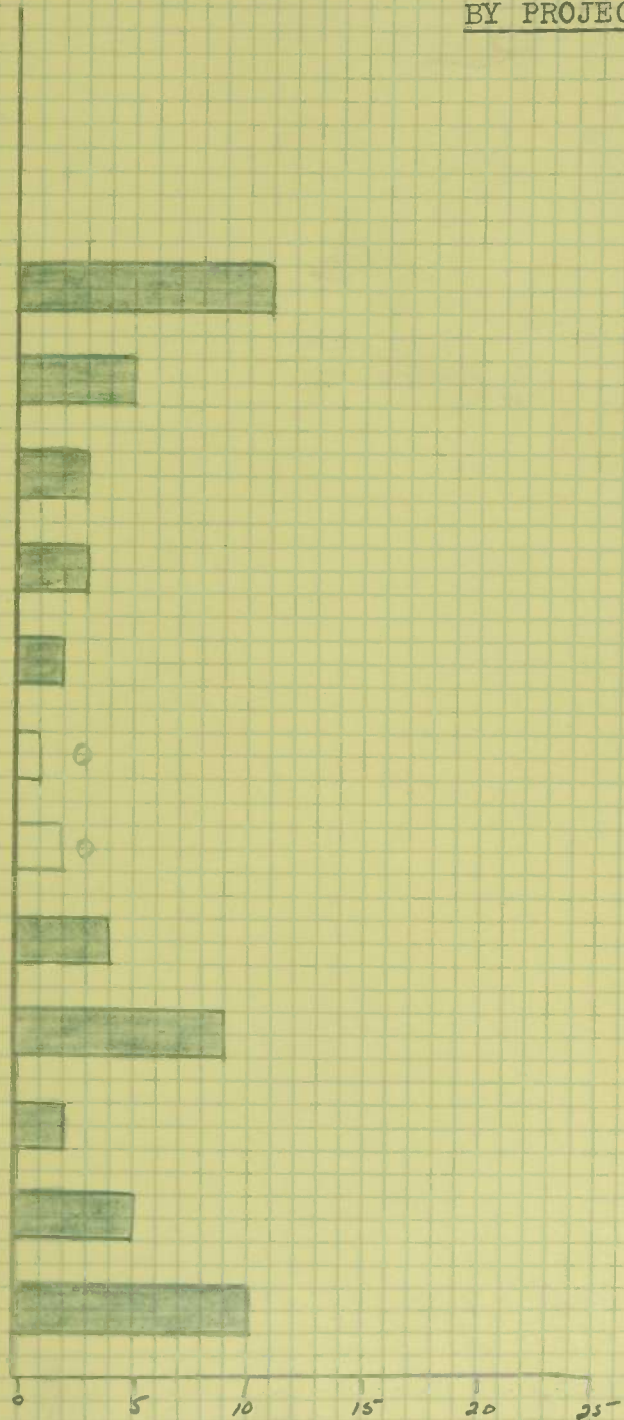

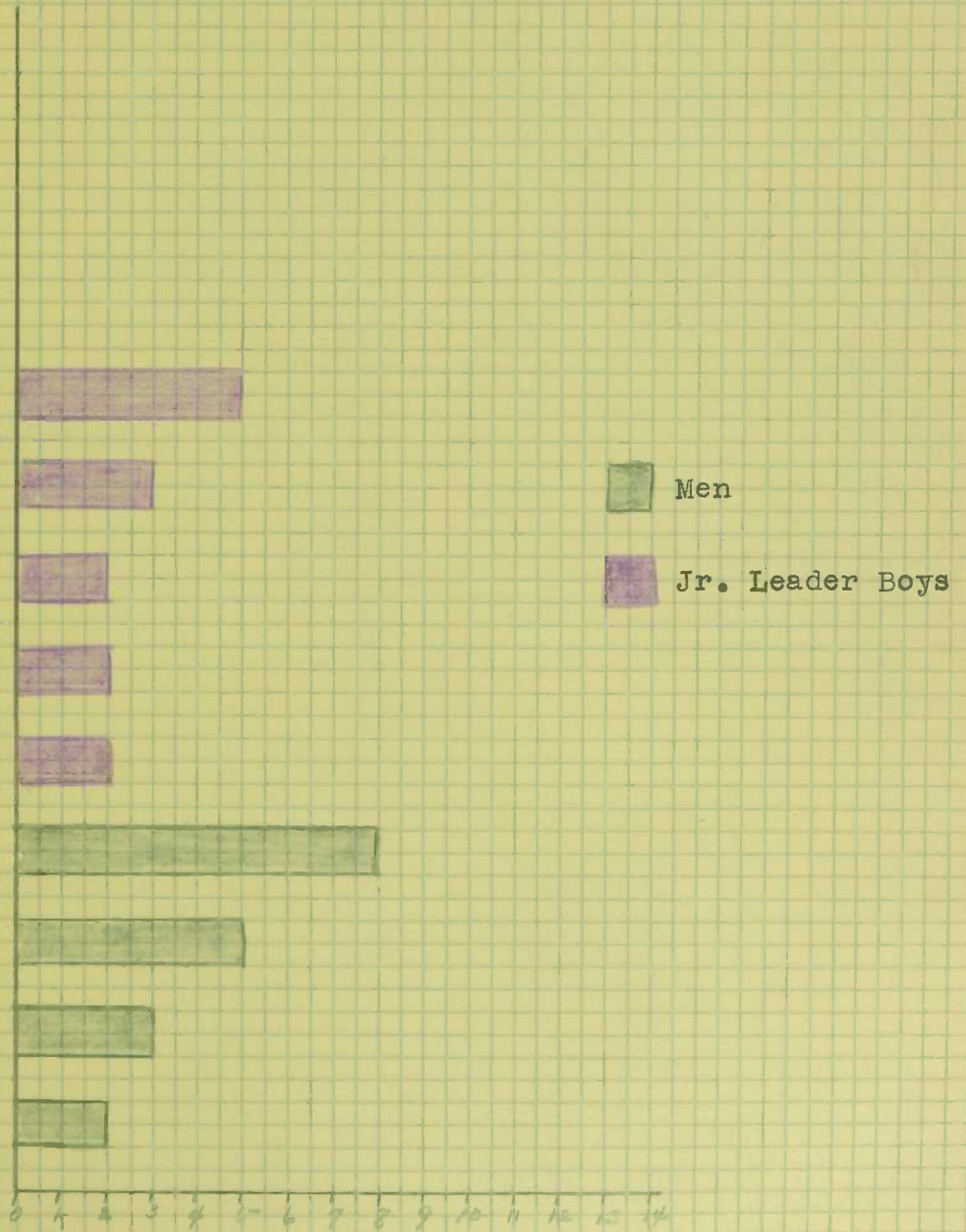

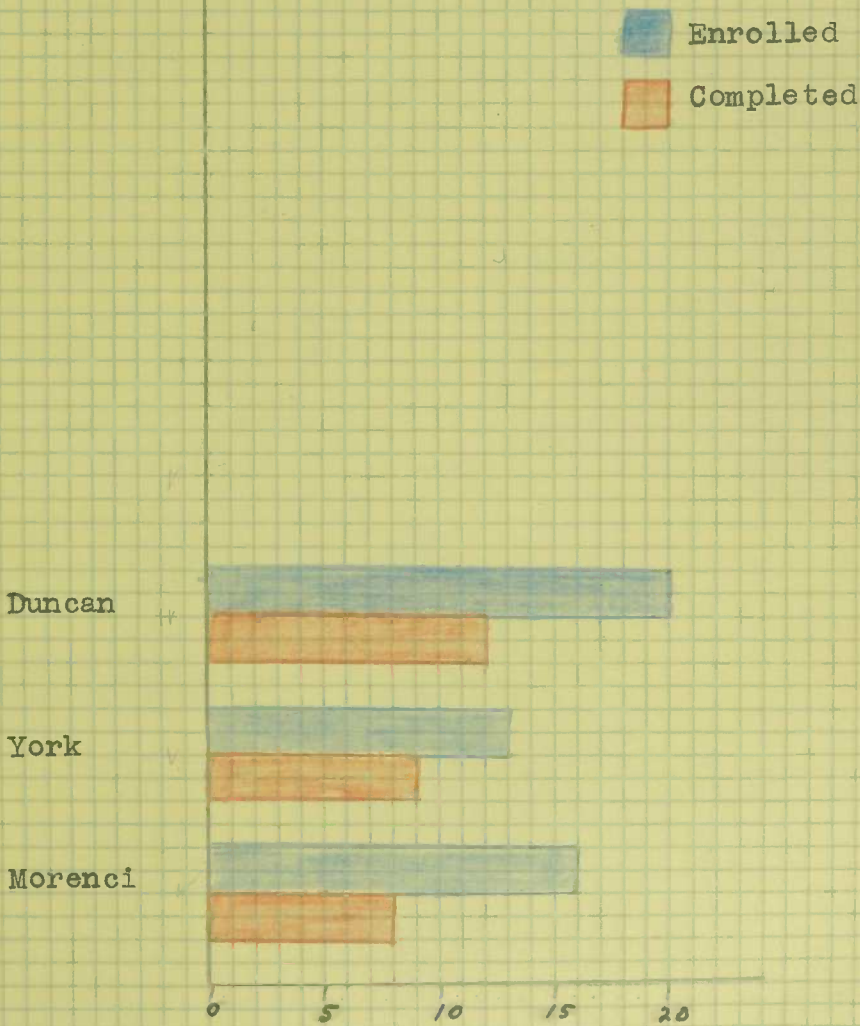

F. Local 4-H Club Programs

All of the clubs had written program plans this year. Leaders and officers made them at the time of their club organization. Recreation, health, safety, and community service were all included in the planned programs.

The York Club is a community club with both boys and girls meeting together for big, extra activities and recreation. Separate meetings are held for project work.

The Morenci girls' club did a fine job of program planning and dittoed copies for each member to have. Revisions were made as were necessary. A copy of the program is included in this report.

The Mothers' Day Program held in the Morenci Club was very valuable. All mothers were invited, given a corsage, and served refreshments by their daughter. The program, given by the girls, included music, demonstrations and business procedure. The Home Demonstration Agent had the opportunity to explain project work and how mothers could help these members and leaders.

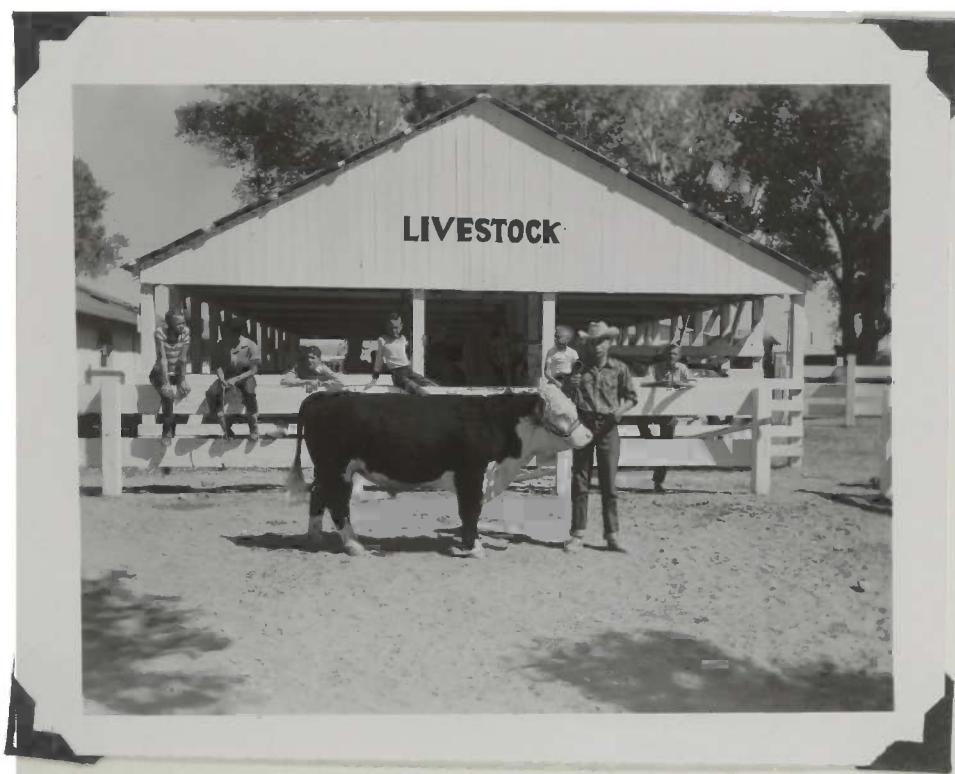
Judging of livestock, poultry, and vegetable crops teaches a 4-H'er to compare the poor with the good. Many of our boys who have taken part in judging have done very good work at making selections on their own farms for foundation stock and fair exhibits. Most of them have contributed their knowledge to the fact that 4-H judging taught them to make these selections.

Boys' and girls' 4-H Club Achievement Day was on October 10, 1953 at the Greenlee County Fair. The presentation of awards opened the afternoon program. County awards, achievement awards, and leadership pins were presented.

The county fair holds much interest for our 4-H boys and girls. Participation was excellent in the fair held October 9, 10, and 11. An effort is being made to improve fair facilities from year to year, much of the improvements are for the 4-H boys and girls benefit.

G. 4-H Activities

1. County

The Greenlee County Fair Commission sponsors exhibits and events for 4-H boys and girls. 4-H'ers carrying agricultural projects were required to show their exhibits at the county fair.

County and state awards to club members and leaders are made at the county fair or school assemblies.

County wide home economics elimination contests for selecting Round-up delegates were held with 24 girls participating. From these dress revue, food, and clothing judging and demonstration teams were selected.

Money earned by club members during National 4-H Club Week is used to help to pay expenses of sending delegates to State Round-up.

Rural Life Sunday was observed throughout the county by both boys and girls. At the Duncan Methodist Church 4-H'ers did everything but give the sermon. The minister gave a sermon entitled "What the 4-H's mean to ME!" In both the Duncan and Franklin LDS Churches, junior leaders gave a talk on 4-H Club work in the community.

Twelve 4-H'ers attended 4-H Camp which was held at Mt. Lemon, August 17 - 22, 1953. This camp is for Pinal, Pima, Santa Cruz, Cochise, Graham, and Greenlee County 4-H boys and girls.

Activities at the camp included leather-craft, ceramics, forestry, wildlife, insect collection, and all types of sports and recreation which included square dancing and folk dancing.

2. State

Sixteen boys, fifteen girls, one leader, and the agents attended the 4-H Round-up in Tucson, June 2 - 6, 1953. There were about 300 other 4-H'ers attending the Round-up from every county in the state except Mohave County.

Results of home economics participation in State Round-up contests were gratifying considering the lack of time for preparing for this event.

Dress Revue - Sally Foote, white robbons, and Wanda Baber a red.

Sally Foote of York was an entry in the "Make it Yourself With Wool".

The poultry teams coached by the poultry project leader, Mr. H. T. Clothier, were outstanding. The Junior team consisting of Judy Clothier, Harry Hill, and Max Lunt took first place and a blue ribbon.

The Senior team, Elaine Brubaker, Bill Hill, and Kenneth Goodman, also took first place. Elaine Brubaker was the high individual of the contest.

The Senior rabbit judging team also took first place. Members of the team were Kenneth Goodman, Dean Lunt, and Henry Brubaker.

Bill Hill was the high individual in dairy judging.

The Senior vegetable judging team also placed in the blue award group.

Bill Hill and Judy Clothier entered the poultry showmanship contest. They both received blue ribbons. Bill was entered in senior competition, and Judy in the junior division.

Bill Sanders and Dud Cox received a blue ribbon for fitting and showing a beef animal.

G. 4-H Activities (Cont.)

Greenlee County's 4-H beef judging team at the Phoenix National Livestock Show took first place. Members of this team were Calvin Sander, Bill Sanders, and Bud Cox. They took first place over fourteen 4-H and FFA teams in the state.

High individuals were Bill Sanders 3rd - Bud Cox 10th.

Each of the boys on the winning team and the Agent received a silver buckle set from the Phoenix Kiwanis Club as a gift.

The award banquet followed the judging contest. The banquet was put on by the Arizona Farmer Magazine.

Greenlee County 4-H Clubs also had two entries in the fat steer class at the Phoenix Show. The entries were Hereford steers owned by Calvin and Bill Sanders. These steers placed eleventh and twelfth in the light weight division. They sold for 45 and 46 cents. The boys were well pleased with the sale and show. Their profit was not too high because they paid a good price for the calves and the price of beef dropped considerably before they were sold.

On January 29, 1953 the championship judging team and Mr. Jack Lunt, President of the Greenlee County Cattlemens' Association, were honored guests of the Duncan Rotary Club. The boys gave a talk on the show and judging contest. Mr. Lunt concluded the program by talking on the difference between show and range animals.

Greenlee County was represented at the Arizona State Fair in November. Senior judging teams in poultry and livestock were entered. The livestock team made up of Bud Cox, William Baber, and Neil Johnson placed in the red ribbon division. Neil Johnson was 6th high individual. Bud Cox, Dean Lunt, and William Baber judged poultry. The poultry team rated 5th, with William Baber placing 6th high individual.

The Duncan Wildkitten 4-H Club, led by Mrs. Sue Davis, won a state 4-H recreation contest. This entitled Greenlee County to a \$25.00 cash award presented by The United States Rubber Company.

G. 4-H Activities (Cont)

Five Standard Oil scholarships were awarded to Arizona 4-H Club members this year. Three of these awards went to Greenlee County.

A \$350.00 scholarship went to Betty Davis, Duncan, Arizona; a \$300.00 scholarship to Kenneth Goodman, Franklin, Arizona; and a \$250.00 scholarship to Bill Sanders of York. These 4-H'ers will be able to attend any regularly accredited college of their choice and enter in any course they desire to study. Betty Davis and Bill Sanders entered the University of Arizona this fall on their scholarships, and Kenneth Goodman is enrolled at Arizona State College at Flagstaff.

Adrian Gale was awarded a \$250.00 Santa Fe scholarship also. He is using his scholarship to attend school at Eastern Arizona Junior College at Thatcher, Arizona.

3. National

Since 1949 Greenlee County has been well represented in national contests. Prior to that time no one from Greenlee County had ever won a trip to National Camp or the National 4-H Congress. Since 1949, three girls and one boy have won trips to the National 4-H Camp. Four girls and two boys have won trips to Chicago.

G. 4-H Activities (Cont.)

Nancy Coon and Adrian Gale, both of Duncan, were awarded a trip to the National 4-H Camp in Washington, D. C. this year. Betty Davis of Duncan was awarded an expense paid trip to Chicago. She was National winner in Dairy Foods Demonstration Contest. This trip was sponsored by the Carnation Milk Company. Two boys and two girls from Arizona were selected to represent the Arizona 4-H Clubs at Washington. This was quite an honor to have two 4-H'ers from Greenlee County selected as state delegates to the National Camp, and one to attend National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Awards were made at the 4-H Round-up. Club leaders have put out a special effort to get this many national winners. It means extra work for leaders, agents, and the club members, but the reward is well worth the effort.

H. Outlook and Recommendations

4-H Club work in Greenlee County is not at its peak even though the number of national and state winners have been high. Greenlee County has 4-H enthusiasm, and it will grow with the years, but it will take considerable effort to keep it going. Keeping older youth in the 4-H program improves the quality. The 4-H junior leadership program will go a long way toward this goal.

A goal is set to place more responsibility for club work into the hands of local leaders and junior leaders. This is highly desirable so that leaders will acknowledge their position of responsibility.

TWO DUNCAN 4-H DELEGATES TO VISIT CAPITOL

Our government in action will be observed by four Arizona delegates to the National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D. C.

Making the Washington trip are Nancy Coon and Adrian Gale of Duncan, Billie Jane Narramore of Palo Verde, and Larry Stallings of Phoenix. The 4-H'ers left Tucson today and will motor through the South on their way to Washington. They will be accompanied by Mrs. Helen Kightlinger, assistant state leader of 4-H club work at the University of Arizona.

Sponsors for the trip are the Arizona Machinery Company, Arizona Flour Mills, Implement Dealers Association of Arizona, and Mr. L. M. Barker, manager of the Phelps Dodge Corporation branch in Morenci.

Scholarships Go To Three Duncan 4-H Club Members

Five Arizona 4-H club members are recipients of Standard Oil Company of California scholarships worth from \$200 to \$350, announces Kenneth L. McKee, state leader of 4-H club work at the University of Arizona.

The wards are made on the basis of scholastic ability, 4-H achievement, character and desire for future education. The girls and boys winning the awards are: Elizabeth Davis, Duncan, \$350; Kenneth Goodman, Franklin, \$300; Marilyn Ziegler, Phoenix, \$250; William Sanders, Duncan, \$250; and John Doty, Tucson, \$200.

Elizabeth Davis has been in the Duncan 4-H club for the past 7 years. She graduated from Duncan high school this spring and was secretary-treasurer of her class. Last year, Elizabeth was named for the trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago and the National 4-H Camp in Washington, D.C. Betty has completed 6 projects in food, 2 in clothing, 4 in food preservation, 2 in junior leadership, 1 in home beautification, and 1 in home improvement. She plans to major in home economics at the University of Arizona.

Kenneth Goodman graduated from Duncan high this spring. He is a member of the Franklin 4-H club. An outstanding athlete, he plans to major in physical education at college. He is a member of the National Honor Society, was student body president this past year and honorary captain of the basketball team. Miss Lucinda Hughes, home demonstration agent in Yavapai and Coconino counties, and Harvey Tate, extension horticulturist at the University, will chaperone the 4-H'ers on their trip.

While in Chicago the trip winners will be entertained by the various donors of the trips at special breakfasts, lunches, and dinners. They will get to visit museums and other points of interest as well as attend the International Livestock Show. They will arrive home December 5.
